



#### WRITER & DIRECTOR

#### DIRECTOR STATEMENT

My inspiration came from the dialogue around foreign buyers in the real estate market and my friend's misunderstanding of the Asian household. The former idea was raised through conversations I had with friends regarding "satellite children". There are assumptions made of these people within the controversial affordability crisis, but I wanted to humanize them and provide a more intimate perspective of their personal life. In addition to this topic, I wanted to provide a better understanding of Asian-Canadian culture in general as I find it is typically under or misrepresented in mainstream media today. For instance, my friend didn't know the familial expectations of moving out of the house were different for Asian-Canadians compared to Western society. Although I was initially offended by their lack of understanding, I realized that Asian-Canadian households are not widely seen on-screen and that my friend had not been exposed to foreign societal conventions. By highlighting these issues, I hope to provide a more accurate representation of the Asian-Canadian community and confront stigmas that might be associated with them.
