
Director's Note

The formation and history of Lake Baikal in Siberia are reimagined, featuring the voice of a Buryat woman who can still recall some words in her endangered Buryat-Mongolian language. The vocabularies from the voice recording re-vitalize the spiritual significance of the terrain and landscape associated with her mother tongue. The sharp decline in Buryat language proficiency in the local region could be linked to the ongoing colonial reality since three hundred years ago as well as the post-Soviet Russian policies in education. The region has been inaccessible because of the pandemic and the current Russia-Ukraine war, the film re-imagines and re-enacts the landscape with various tangible and tactile materials gathered from my daily life in Germany, almost 7000 km away from Lake Baikal.

Cape Burkhan/Shaman Rock/Shamanka, located on Olkhon Island of the lake, consists of crystalline limestone and white marble. It is considered a sacred place by the indigenous Buryat people. Throughout the animation process, I gathered various quartz, stones and other objects in nature, through friendship, in my everyday life, and from my personal collections. The smaller pieces of quartz were hand-harvested on the Alps in Switzerland by a friend who grew up on the Alpine mountains and is familiar with the regional geology. The intangible historicity and formation of the lake are explored in a non-anthropomorphic way through hand-painted animation with the gathered physical objects and textural materials through an embedded and embodied process to bring forth the indigenous language, story and cosmology from Lake Baikal.

Director's Biography

Alisi Telengut is a Canadian artist of Mongolian descent, living between Berlin, Germany and Tiohtià:ke/ Montréal, Canada. She creates animation frame by frame under the camera with mixed media to generate movement, and explore hand-made and painterly visuals for her films. Alisi is a Canadian Screen Award nominee and a Québec Cinéma Awards - Prix Iris winner in Best Animated Film. Her work received multiple international awards and nominations, including the Best Short Film at Stockholm Film Festival (Sweden), Best Animated Film at Mammoth Lakes Film Festival (USA), Brussel Independent Film Festival (Belgium), and Jury Award at the Aspen Shortsfest (USA). Alisi's work has been screened and exhibited internationally, such as at the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures (USA), Sundance Film Festival (USA), TIFF (Canada), the Canadian Cultural Centre at the Embassy of Canada in France, CICA Museum - Czong Institute for Contemporary Art (South Korea), UNESCO World Heritage Site Zollverein (Germany), Images Festival (Canada), Image Forum (Japan), VIDEONALE at Kunstmuseum Bonn - Museum of Painting and Contemporary Art Bonn (Germany).


